The Do's of How to Get Sheets White Again Washing your white sheets can feel like a tricky task, but there are a few full-proof techniques that work every time. Here's what you should be doing to clean white sheets. Liquid Bluing Bluing is a technique that's often used by clothing manufacturers as the finishing process on white fabrics. Unfortunately, every time you wash your white sheets, this effect wears off a little more. You can get this effect back by buying liquid bluing at your local grocery or hardware store and apply it to your white sheets. It's most effective if you repeat this every couple of washes to keep your sheets looking brand spanking new. Borax Borax is a highly effective whitening agent available at most grocery stores. It's a powdery white mineral that aids in lifting discolorations and stains, returning garments back to sparkling white. It works best when it's exposed to the fabric for periods of time. For this reason, adding it to water and soaking your white sheets overnight is often the most effective way to use Borax. Vinegar If you feel your sheets need a little something extra, vinegar makes a great natural pre-wash. Soak your sheets in a bucket of warm water and half a cup of vinegar for about an hour before you put them in the wash. This helps to soften the sheet and also works as an incredible fabric softener. Pro tip: If you are worried about the smell of vinegar sticking around on your sheets, air dry your sheets in the sun. This eliminates any lingering vinegar smell from your newly washed bedding. Lemon Juice Lemons contain loads of citric acid, which is great for whitening sheets. It's also an easy-to-use solution for those under a time crunch. By adding the juice from one lemon to your washing machine, along with your regular detergent, you will see an increase in the brightness of your sheets. One added benefit of this natural solution is that your sheets come out smelling lemon-fresh. This is especially helpful if you also opted to soak your sheets in vinegar before the wash, as the lemon completely takes away the smell of the vinegar. Baking Soda Although baking soda is often thought of as an odor neutralizer, it can also aid in whitening your sheets. Simply add baking soda to your normal detergent and it will enhance its whitening effects. This is a great painless option for those who don't have time to wait for their white bedsheets to soak before throwing them in the washing machine. The Don'ts of How to Whiten Your Sheets The way you clean your white sheets could be making a bad situation worse. (Image credit: Credit: BSIP/UIG via Getty Images) More and more people are tossing out the harsh chemicals from their daily cleaning routine and instead turning to natural products, such as baking soda and vinegar, to remove grime, disinfect surfaces and leave spaces shiny and clean, according to Reader's Digest. So why are these household items such effective cleaning agents? The answer is pretty basic — baking soda and vinegar lie on opposite ends of the pH scale. "When you are cleaning using baking soda or vinegar, you are actually doing very complicated manipulations of molecules," said May Nyman, a professor in the department of chemistry at Oregon State University. Baking soda is the common name for sodium bicarbonate (NaHCO₃). Most people probably associate it with cooking, because it makes your cakes and breads big and puffy. Vinegar is a dilute solution of acetic acid (HC₂H₃O₂), produced by bacteria during fermentation. Related: Does salt make water boil faster? Baking soda is the opposite of vinegar. It is harsh like vinegar but dissolves organic matter." Nyman told Live Science. "Like vinegar, it cannot harm you and will not be harmful when cleaning places where you store your food." Both kitchen ingredients are effective cleaning agents because they are found on opposite sides of the pH scale. pH is a measure of how acidic or basic a substance is, on a scale from 1 (very acidic) to 14 (very basic), with a neutral value at 7. Pure water has a pH of 7. Baking soda has a pH of 9, while vinegar has a pH of 2, according to the U.S. Geological Survey. Cleaning one-two punch As a base, baking soda dissolves organic compounds like dirt, grease and other sticky ickies. In addition, the mineral structure of each baking soda particle provides a gentle abrasive to clean without leaving scratches behind. As an acid, vinegar breaks down minerals that form from hard tap water, forming unsightly stains on sinks, tubs and counters. Combining these two common household substances can produce incredible results in the kitchen, but it's important to not combine them in equal amounts because you need to keep the mixture in either the acidic or basic side of the neutral value. When baking soda is mixed with vinegar, the acid breaks down baking soda, releasing carbon dioxide gas that can help lift dirt from the surfaces being cleaned. Everyday items on the pH scale. (Image credit: Shutterstock) Here are some recipes to try. Freshen your sink by mixing one part of baking soda with two parts of vinegar. This mixture undergoes an effervescent fizz of carbon dioxide that cleans and freshens drains. Remove hard water stains by placing a vinegar-soaked towel over the affected area. After a few hours, remove the cloth and scrub the affected area with a paste made of baking soda and water. Kill mildew in laundry using baking soda and vinegar. Add a half a cup of baking soda with the laundry detergent to supercharge the cleaning process. Follow this with one cup of vinegar during the rinse cycle to kill bacteria and soften fabric. Clean grout by applying a baking soda paste made of baking soda and water. Spray the paste with vinegar before scrubbing the grime away. Originally published on Live Science. Personally, I've (Slumber Yard member Kelsey) always had white sheets and white bedding. There is something about feeling like you're laying in a big comfy cloud, like brookline sheets, that puts me to sleep more peacefully and soundly. So as you can imagine, over time, I've learned the best tips on how to get sheets white — and keep them that way. In addition to keeping sheets clean, I also make sure to fold them properly. Folding your sheets properly, prevents them from getting wrinkled and looking old and weathered. I particularly found learning to fold my fitted sheets properly made all the difference. Also, how does one get stains out of purple sheets or patterned sheets? I always had security in the thought that if I spilled on my cloud-like white sheets, I could just bleach them back to perfection. But over time, I noticed my white sheets getting more and more yellow hued. So instead of purchasing new sheets every six months, I decided to do some research on how to get yellow stains out of white sheets, how to wash white sheets in a way that really and truly maintains (or even reverses back to) pearly white bedding. Why Bleach Is Not The Answer If you think that bleach is the answer for white sheets, you're wrong! If you're wondering how to bleach sheets, turns out, doing so is one of the worst things you can do to keep them white. Bleach contains chlorine, which chemically reacts to the protein stains like sweat, body oils, sexual fluids, vomit, etc., to create a yellow and dingy stain. Not to worry, though, as there are so many other laundering options when it comes to your white bedding. How To Get Yellow Stains Out Of White Sheets First, you can use a whitening laundry booster like OxiClean or Borax. The best way to use these is to soak your bedding overnight in it with water (follow directions per laundry booster for amounts), and then launder them as usual. If you want a more natural route, you can use normal household items such as vinegar, lemon, and baking soda. I like to pre-soak the bedding in hot water and half a cup of vinegar for about an hour. Then I wash them as a normal load, but add half a cup of baking soda or lemon juice along with the detergent. These are both powerful natural whiteners. Personally, I like lemon juice because of the slightly citrus smell, and I think that it kills off the lingering odor from the vinegar soak best. Last but definitely not least, is bluing. Bluing is when you add a solution (we like Mrs. Stewart's) with blue tints to your wash. The blue counteracts the yellow hues to create a crisp white. Be careful, though, because this stuff stains. Be sure to follow the instructions very carefully because you'll need to dilute it quite a bit. Try this for yourself, because this stuff really works. This is one you might have learned the hard way, when a pesky red underwear got mixed in and before you knew it, all your whites were pink. Keep whites with whites to keep them at their best color. Launder regularly. Even if you shower every night before you get into bed, dead skin, hair, and other things transfer on your sheets through the week. It's gross, but it's true. When they build up, they create a dingy yellow cast. Make sure to wash your bedding (including your pillow cases!) at least once every two weeks or even once a week if you have the time. Air dry if possible. This won't help with making your sheets anymore white, but will keep your bedding soft and maintain its quality. More Tips On Washing Sheets And Bedding How to Clean Cat Pee from Sheets and Blankets We all love our furry friends, but sometimes your cat slips up and pees on your sheets or blankets. In the worst case scenario, cat pee can also soil the mattress. But fret not if this happens, as there are ways to remove cat pee from a mattress and get rid of the odor. Do not put the sheet or bedding stained with pee directly in the washing machine. First of all, rinse out the stain with running cold water and then blot dry with a paper towel. This will ensure that you remove as much of the stain as possible. Then mix one cup of white vinegar to three cups of water, and use it to coat the area stained with pee. Although vinegar has a funky smell, it fades away quickly and so should the smell of cat pee. You can throw the blanket or sheet in the washer after this if you wish. Do not wash a sheet stained with cat pee in the washer with other clothing items, as the cat pee smell might spread to those items. How to Wash Different Types of Blankets A lot of people wash sheets, bedding, and blankets by just throwing it in the washer. If you learn to wash your blankets, sheets and bedding properly they come out looking fresh and fluffy and they don't depreciate as frequently as they would if you wash them the wrong way. Sheets, blankets, throws and other types of bedding are made with different materials like polyester, cotton, mink, wool etc. This means they require different types of care and specific washing instructions, so make sure to check your linen's care tag before throwing anything in the washing machine. Some blankets may require dry cleaning. How to Wash Wool Blankets When washing a wool blanket, you should use a mild detergent so as not to damage the wool. Harsh detergents are not good for wool which is a textile fiber obtained from Sheep. Before you wash a wool blanket, you should brush the blanket with a soft bristle brush to remove any large particles. After brushing the blanket, wash it in a washing machine using cold water and on a gentle cycle. Don't wash a wool blanket for too long (max five minutes). After the five minute wash time, switch to the rinse cycle. Do not put your wool blanket in a dryer. Air dry by hanging it but do not directly expose it to sunlight. Always store your wool blankets in a cool and dry place. How to Wash a Weighted Blanket When preparing to wash a weighted blanket, you must first check the type of blanket, whether it be a gravity weighted blanket or a Buffy comforter, what material it's made of and what type of filler it has. Then, you should check the manufacturing guidelines for a specific set of instructions on how to wash it. Doing this ensures that you don't damage the blanket by washing it the wrong way. When washing a weighted blanket, avoid using bleach and fabric softeners. Use only mild detergent and wash on a gentle cycle in your washing machine and with cold water. After washing you can air dry it on a clean surface or dry it in a dryer on a low heat cycle. Read more on how to wash a weighted blanket here. How to Wash Polyester Blanket A polyester blanket is probably one of the most common types of blankets. To get these blankets clean, it'll just require warm water and with a mild detergent. Dry it in

low heat, and don't let it sit in the dryer after drying. Bring it out of the dryer immediately after to ensure that your polyester blanket doesn't get wrinkled.



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
